

## ADVISORY COMMITTEE MEETING

Last fall two members, Mr. L. F. LeSturgeon and Mr. William P. 'Bill' Terrell of Charlotte NC, began to discuss their mutual interest in the advancement of the Society and wanted to do something for the benefit of all the membership toward achieving the objec-

tives of the Society as outlined in the Articles of Incorporation.

Although he has limited mobility due to a knee condition, Mr. LeSturgeon is a very alert octogenarian who loves to write letters and converse on the phone with people who share his genealogical interest in the Terrell variations.

Approximately 2 months of letter writing and phone calls resulted in the forming of a small group not only dedicated enough to travel to Charlotte NC at their own expense and on their own time, but also willing to pay expenses for the Society Secretary and Editor to attend to provide details of the forming and operation of the Society since

its inception.

On January 31, 1987, the first meeting of the ADVISORY COMMITTEE of the Terrell Society of America, Inc. was held in the conference room at Graftech in Charlotte. Graftech is a printing and public relations firm. Bill Terrell is president of Graftech and in addition to providing facilities, also provided a secretary to keep the minutes.

ADVISORY COMMITTEE is a term you will be hearing more and more about in the months and years to

come, so a word of explanation is in order.

First, the Advisory Committee of the Terrell Society of America, Inc. is not made up of a certain small group of individuals who want to run things for

the rest of the Society.

It was agreed in Charlotte that the Advisory Committee will be open to all members who will take the time to attend any meeting that can be arranged, therefore, the next Advisory Committee meeting may have entirely different persons attending with a chairman chosen at that time by those attending or providing a place and making arrangements for the meeting.

Secondly, it was agreed that the Advisory Committee is just that ADVISORY, and nothing more. The committee will not have



any authority to implement any ideas or suggestions on behalf of the Society until such suggestions have been approved by the Board and a majority of the general membership. In other words, the Advisory Committee will be a flexible think tank where members can get together at various times and places to share ideas and pool their various talents toward the development of plans to accomplish the objectives listed in the Articles of Incorporation (pages 51 & 52 of TRAILS)

Third, it was agreed that the Advisory Committee would not have any set place to hold meetings, but would be moved about over the country wherever several members are willing to meet. Unless a group of members feels a need for another meeting before then, the next meeting is tentatively scheduled for Oct. 30 1987 at Unicoi State Park, the day before our annual Reunion. You are welcome to attend. By then, you will have had time to digest the suggestions of this meeting and be in a position to add your expertise to the pool of ideas. Details of the exact time and place will appear in future issues of TRAILS.

Those attending the first Advisory Committee Meeting in alphabetical order were: Dan Brinson (Society Secretary & Editor), Douglasville, GA; Mr. Guy Clarke, Jr., Richmond VA; Mr. L. F. LeSturgeon, Charlotte; Bill Terrell, Charlotte; Mr. Lake & Mrs. Alma Terrell, Sumter, SC; Mr. Lowell & Mrs. Eleanor Terrell (Society Treasurer), Jonesboro, GA; Mr. John Terrell, Hickory NC; Mr. Leslie and Mrs. Edna Terrell Wages, Jacksonville, FL.

Without getting into personalities and details of who suggested what, the following events occurred as indicated in the minutes: Mr. LeSturgeon briefly related the events leading up to this meeting; Mr. Bill Terrell began a round of introductions in which each one present introduced another person in the group, an interesting session to say the least, as the poet wrote in Ode to a Louse, 'Oh, to see ourselves as others see us!'; the fact that Mr. Todd had resigned was mentioned briefly and it was pointed out that the Articles of Incorporation and By-Laws spell out the procedure which must be followed in selection of a replacement (see separate article); it was pointed out that the primary interest which prompted

this meeting was a desire to see a TERRELL ARCHIVE created where genealogical fact could be separated from family tradition & myth, if possible to see duplicate archives at several locations around the country so that a single disaster could not wipe out the entire collection; and that it would require the help and cooperation of every member to accomplish that task.

SUGGESTIONS FOR COMMITTEES: it was pointed out that no committee could be recommended until the committee had been first defined, ie, task, duties, and desirable qualifications, and secondly the entire membership had been surveyed for time, talents, and most of all, willingness to serve. It was pointed out that a reluctant committee member, especially a chairman, is worse than no committeeman at all. With these thoughts in mind, the group suggested the need for the following committees.

ARCHIVE COMMITTEE: to be responsible for establishment of a central library, storage, reproduction, and management of materials; duties include organizing what we have to avoid duplication, determining the states and counties (from Census indexes) where Terrells have lived for location of original documents for the archive collection, locate persons willing to collect and/or donate the needed materials; helpful talents would include the ability to organize and catalog materials in various sizes and shapes consisting not only of printed materials, but of microfilm, photos, and artifacts.

FINANCE COMMITTEE: to be responsible for raising funds above usual membership dues which are barely adequate to cover publication of TRAILS and minor office expense, identify and classify needs according to the value and merit of each, oversee the spending of a special fund separate from membership dues, oversee bonding of the treasurer and auditing of the books; talents needed include some knowledge of civic fund raising from the private and government sectors, some knowledge of accounting and bookkeeping, ability to set objective priorities and stick to them, etc. This committee needs to be gotten off the ground as soon as possible and those attending donated or pledged over \$800.00 to start the kitty.

RESEARCH COMMITTEE: duties to search for records and data that we do not

have in our collection, probably should begin with xerox copies of all census indices for the Terrell Variants to determine where they lived in each census year, followed by reading published works for additional leads, and finally by hot, dusty, and eye straining physical search of microfilm and original documents in public depositories, procurement of hard copy (printed or xerox) of original documents to be turned over to the Archives Committee; talents should include access to public depositories, archives, libraries, court houses, etc., patience to search for long hours with little or no success, and most of all, willingness and persistence to keep on keeping on.

SOCIAL COMMITTEE: duties similar to any other civic and social organization, to locate places for reunions and meetings, to determine the better times and places to meet, to plan programs of interest to the membership so that a reunion will be a learning experience, not just an elbow rubbing; talents should include a knowledge or flair for entertaining all ages, or at least some specific age group, organizational ability to get all the ingredients to the right place at the right time, and a desire to meet people and see them enjoy themselves.

MEMBERSHIP COMMITTEE: duties would be to survey our present membership to determine the likes and dislikes of our members, to help plan promotional items to attract new members, to help keep membership records up to date, and to encourage members to keep renewing each year; talents needed include a 'gift of gab,' tact, charm, willingness to spend hours in serious planning sessions, ability to communicate by phone or printed word.

PUBLICATIONS COMMITTEE: duties to help determine the likes and dislikes of the membership in regard to Terrell Trails, to seek ways to improve the publication with minimum of additional cost, to determine what, if any, other publications, books, etc. are necessary for the accomplishment of our objectives; talents include organizational ability to coordinate the activities of several people, writers, editor, printer, colators, & mailroom services (if we ever get to the point where your editor doesn't have it all to do himself).

#### ADVISORY FOLLOW-UP MEETING

On March 31, 1987, a follow-up meeting was held in Charlotte, NC for the purpose of recommending Guide Lines for the SPECIAL ARCHIVE FUND proposed at the Jan 31 meeting and to discuss all other agenda items that time permitted. Those attending included: Mr. Lee Y. Ponder (President Pro-Tem), Mr. Lawrence LeSturgeon (Correspondence Secretary Pro-Tem), Mr. Bill Terrell (V-P Archives & Finance Pro-Tem), and Mr. Lake E. Terrell, Jr (proposed chairman of the Finance Committee).

Mr. LeSturgeon reports the following proposals as result of this meeting:

Purpose of SPECIAL ARCHIVE FUND is to pay for establishing a central archive for TERRELL & related families; possible sources of funds include direct contributions to this fund in addition to the Regular Fund which publishes TRAILS, sale of Novelties, Books, and Pamphlets, fees for answering queries, lending library fees, and possibly \$1.00 or \$2.00 from each individual annual dues donation; possible uses of this fund include book purchases, copying costs, publication of new and updated genealogy books, purchase parts & supplies for computer, upgrading to larger and better computer system, travel expenses for some business meetings and gathering archive data (only if authorized by the board, at present limited to the Society Secretary), some membership drives costing over \$100.00 each. AUDIT COMMITTEE was suggested to check accuracy of financial records.

It was felt by those attending that the newly created SPECIAL FUND is the most important recommendation that has been made. Without a SPECIAL FUND, the Terrell Society of America, Inc. will not be able to grow, expand and improve, much less accomplish the goals enumerated in the ARTICLES OF INCORPORATION. ####

3. *Terrell Genealogy* by Emma Dicken; most comprehensive publication we have found; excellent index; \$22.00
4. *Terrell Family* by Nellie F. Ayers; 1946; takes her Terrell line back 6000 yrs to Adam & Eve; 22 Terrell charts back through Royalty; 30 Pedigree charts taking the Terrell Family back to 1300 BC; \$17.00
5. *Genealogy Notes on the Terrells of Virginia* (revised 1909) by Edwin Holland Terrell, San Antonio TX; Ambassador to Belgium \$7.00
6. *Tyrrells - Terrells of America*; by Joseph Henry Tyrrell; 1910 Supplement; Published in England; \$7.00

INITIAL LENDING TERMS: price shown after each book is purchase price which includes postage & handling, and is also the required deposit to borrow that book.

Keep the book three weeks and return it; you will be refunded your full amount less a \$5.00 lending fee for each book

Keep the book over 3 weeks, and it is yours--your deposit will be forfeited.

We stress that these are initial terms. They are not chiseled in stone and can be changed when and as the need arises. These deposits may seem a bit high, and may be higher than those levied by other mail lending libraries. However, we are a volunteer organization with no paid staff. Our funds for postage, etc. are very limited. By getting a deposit equal to the purchase price, we won't have to use our limited funds trying to get books returned. Also, if you find that you want to keep the book, you do not have to do anything--you have already paid for it! ####

## INCORPORATION/BY-LAWS SUMMARY

A reduced copy of the Articles of Incorporation and By-Laws appears on pages 50-51 of TRAILS. However, the print is small and the reading dry. For the benefit of those of you who may be considering running for office and/or serving on one of the proposed committees, our Correspondence Secretary, Mr. L. F. LeSturgeon, has summarized them and we are publishing that summary here in full size for your convenience:

ARTICLES OF INCORPORATION  
NON-PROFIT CORPORATION, Article III, State of Georgia; PURPOSES, Article IV, locate descendants of John Terrell, other Terrell and related lines, Accept descendants as members, collect photos, artifacts, & documents to make available to members & public; MEMBERSHIP, Article VI, proven descent from Terrell-Tyrrell and related lines; BOARD OF TRUSTEES & AUTHORITY, Articles VII & VIII, not less than 3 or more than 7 members on board, directors will be officers including President, 1 or more Vice-President, Secretary, & Treasurer, serve an indefinite term, Affairs of the Corporation to be managed by the Board, limitation of authority to borrow money in name of the Corporation, 51% vote of board is necessary for approval or rejection; ABILITY TO ACCEPT CONTRIBUTIONS, Article IX, Corporation may accept contributions, gifts, money, or property - with or without restrictions [that meet incorporation requirements]; AMENDMENTS TO ARTICLES, Article X, may be amended by majority

vote of the Board; DISSOLUTION OF CORPORATION, Article XI, everything to be donated to DEPT. OF ARCHIVES & HISTORY, State of GA, or other state archive willing to accept; OFFICIAL ADDRESS/REGISTERED AGENT, Article XIV, Mrs. Eleanor Terrell is registered agent, hers and the official corporate address is 9719 Brown Road, Jonesboro, Clayton County, GA 30236, CHARTER is recorded in Clayton County, GA Clerk of Superior Court, original official charter is in possession of Mrs. Terrell.

#### SOCIETY HISTORY/ STATUS HISTORY

05/19/1984 the first reunion of the descendents of John and Marian Terrell- [1] was held in Jonesboro, GA with 150 present; Society formed.

18 members joined by 05/31/1985.

Second reunion 06/01/1985, Cain Center, Athens, TX; 50 present, 13 joined.

*Terrell Trails* name selected and Volume I, numbers 1,2,& 3 published and mailed in Sept, 1985; Vol I #4 distributed Dec 1985; total 38 pages plus 4 page index containing over 1100 names from Adams to Zinn.

Society incorporated Dec 31, 1985; 63 members listed, but one had deceased; total contributions received in 1985 \$748.00.

*Terrell Trails* promoted with complimentary memberships to library of Congress, Genealogical Helper, and several other societies & libraries.

*Terrell Society & Reunion* promoted with free publicity releases to over 50 columnists as well as to archives, libraries, and historical sites for which editor was able to obtain addresses during Spring 1986.

Third reunion, Westwood, CA 07/19/1986; 57 present; membership total 122. Those present felt the 15 who did not renew should have one additional notice and invitation to send in dues and keep

getting newsletter; editor wrote each who did not renew, but only one elected to do so, leaving us with 14 who did not renew from 1985.

*Terrell Trails* published and distributed quarterly on schedule in 1986, we replaced the 4 pages of index to Vol 1 and added 80 pages, bringing our page numbers to 122 with a 16 page index #122A-122M, or roughly 5 times the minimum we promised. The new index contains 3152 entries from Adams to Zinn containing a total of 759 different surnames with the following number of different Christian names for each of *Terrell* variations: Terral 1; Terrall 1; Terrel 1; Terrell 501; Therrill 2; Terrill 156; Tirel 10; Tirrell 17; Tyrell 2; & Tyrrell 53. Several economical methods of reproducing photos without cost of screening each were tried; the 122A-M index page numbering will permit us to continue with page 123 in Vol III #1, and when new index is made, those pages can be discarded without having to be replaced with new materials.

Total contributions received in 1986 \$1575.50 plus \$93.00 for 1987 renewals prior to 12/31/1986. Totals included \$168.00 from sale of back issues of Vol I of *Terrell Trails*; \$23.00 designated to be used for book purchases; \$10.00 designated for surname index search of Indiana Records; and \$13.00 designated for microfilm purchases.

#### PRESENT STATUS

[JAN 1 1987, see other articles outlining later developments]

Membership total Dec 31, 1986, 141 less 14 who did not renew and one deceased = 127 active members, a few of whom renewed for 1987 in early to mid December. We tried to end the year with about \$100.00 in the bank account. Due to underestimating the size of the index to *Trails* Vol II, we had less than \$50.00 if my information is correct.

The membership record form (computer) has been revised to allow for up to 7 purchase transactions per member instead of 3 as last year; the 'M/M' designation and the '& Family' designation for 2 copies and 4 copies respectively of *Terrell Trails* have been removed; space has been added for exact # of Copies (1 to 99) to indicate how many to mail to each member; all members names, addresses, and phone num-

bers have been entered on the updated form; renewals are being entered as received.

Renewal interest has been good; 14 responded by Jan 2; 6 of those paid for a binder for *Terrell Trails*. If this trend continues, we should have between 50 and 60 binders in circulation among our membership by spring. The few notes enclosed have been cheerful, thankful, etc., with no serious complaints, each seems to be looking forward to a bigger and better year.

One member sent funds to cover copies of two volumes from the TERRELL COLLECTION in addition to renewal and binder. The PROSPECT LIST OF ADDRESSES is growing steadily. As result of an article in *Terrell Trails* listing the number of variations in greater Atlanta and requesting that members take time to check their area and send us the names, addresses, and zip codes resulted in response from 3 members west of the Mississippi River with almost 200 additional prospects; editor has entered all the variants from the greater Atlanta telephone directory (over 300) and is in the process of obtaining zip codes so that each can be reached with our reunion announcement this year; we need members who can and will to search phone directories all over the SE USA and send us all the names and addresses of TERRELLS and descendants that they can find. With the reunion in the SE this year, we need to BLITZ this area with announcements.

#### PRESENT NEEDS

We are getting to the point where we need to get some binders with TERRELL COLLECTION USA imprinted upon them to contain our collection and our loose-leaf correspondence files as well as our membership records, etc. One member who asked to remain anonymous promised to secure a dozen last year, but has not been heard from since. If these do not arrive within the next 6 months, we must see about financing and purchasing them elsewhere.

We need to review and plan our future archive carefully to avoid duplication as much as possible.

We need to develop a sound, practical, and workable plan for securing funds to accomplish our objectives.

Unicoi has 50 RV sites and 30 tent sites, if camping is your bag. Therefore we are not limited to the 124-130 persons that can be housed in the 25 lodge rooms, but we do need to fill at least 20 rooms in the lodge to get use the living area for our meeting.

16 hillside platforms that sleep 4 and are called 'Squirrel's Nests.' Each platform is on stilts on a steep hillside and has a floor, back wall, and roof. All of our children would be in danger of having them if it Should Get among our famly. We have not heard from Charlie in Some time. He now lives in one mile of Milltown So he wrote to Minnie Williams. We hardly ever here from William & family Hesters brother write to us evry weak or sow. her oldest brother and both the girls are married the youngest brother stayed with us a month before Christmas. he will be back again this fall. Cora will go home with him when he comes and if it is about Christmas Bobbie will go with them. they are all well and geting on well. our little babe is about three months old. She is peart and grows fast. her name is Susie Lee. Hester's health is much improved to what it was. Still she is not ovly stout yet. We have a new Preacher on our circuit here this year. his name is Singleton. he is a good old man and I think we will like him well. he lives at the Parsonage in Zebulon. he has a small family. also we have a young Preacher by the name of Ellesson [Cook?]. he is a nice and tallented man. We are needing of rain at this time. our unbroken land is geting hard. this year I will

have about one hundred and Six acres in cultivation, 65 or 70 in cotton, the rest in corn, potatoes, & c. I am running a three mule farm. have one boy hired. we are felling our way with the crop so far. will commence planting cotton Seed about the 4 of April, Monday week. We are planting for 25 or 30 bales of cotton. You all must come to See us Soon as you can. We will be buisy until we get our crops maid. We will come Soon as we can. I got a postal from Harrison this week. he writes that (King? Ring?) & Willie are both Sick. he wanted us to come up to See him and help him in Some way but I can not leave home now. I will wait to him soon. We all send much love to you both also the children. I send this to both through the Kindness of (Flourie?, definitely not spelled with a 'y' as in first sentence). We remain your brother and Sister Affectionately A. D. & Hester A. Terrel

Born in 1762 in England (place unknown) and a Quaker, he settled in Virginia sometime before the Revolutionary War. He joined the colonial army at age 14 and served 7 years. He married Mary Hughes, moved to Harrison County, [West] Virginia, fathered 13 children, died around 1830, and is buried near Clarksburg, West Virginia. 1/

A Mathew Terrell was listed as a private in Hasbrouck's Regiment of the New York militia (dates unknown). 2/

Records from 1799 to 1809 show that a Mathew Terrell owned 15 acres of land valued at 6 (dollars?). 4/ (There was no entry in the records for Mathew after 1809.)

[In addition to the information on Mathew, the Harrison County records show that a Hulda Terrell, daughter of Martha (no father's name given), was married to Edward Thompson on December 28, 1797; also that, in 1798, a Jephthah Terrell owned 110 acres of land valued at around 55 (dollars?).]

#### II. Timothy Terrell

Born in 1785 in Harrison County, [West] Virginia, sixth and only identified child of Mathew and Mary (Hughes) Terrell. On May 5, 1804, in Harrison County, he married Elizabeth Nixon, who was born in Hampshire County, [West] Virginia, on June 11, 1782, to Jonathan and Nancy Sarah (Pugh) Nixon. Timothy and Elizabeth had seven known children: Jane, Hiram, John, Joab, William, and Jesse, all born in [West] Virginia, and Jackson, born in Ohio. Timothy moved his family to Ohio in 1815. Elizabeth died on February 18, 1838, and Timothy died on May 12, 1849, and both are buried in the Webb Summit Cemetery near Marxville, Perry County, Ohio. 1/ In 1810, the Harrison County census lists Timothy and a female (his wife?) as aged between 26 and 45 with two males and two females (his sons and daughter?), all under the age of 10. 2/

A Timothy Terrell married an Elizabeth Nixon [sic], daughter of Jonathan and Sarah Nixon, on May 3, 1804. 2/

Records for 1810 to 1814 show that a Timothy Terrell owned 100 acres of land valued at around 50 (dollars?). 4/ (There was no entry for Timothy after 1814.)

#### Matthew Terrell Descendants

[III and IV]. Further information on Timothy's descendants:

Nothing further is known about Jane or Joab Terrell.

John Terrell was said to have had five children (mother's name and their names are unknown). 1/

William Terrell was said to have been a steamboat captain on the Mississippi River. 1/

Jesse Terrell was born on January 23, 1812, and married Nancy Webb, daughter of Ralph Webb, on September 19, 1833, in Perry County, Ohio. They were the parents of ten children: Leroy S., Martha J., William, Isaac, Mary Ida, Jerome, Hiram, Benjamin G., Samuel T., and Frank, all born in Marxville, Ohio. Jesse died on March 30, 1908, and he, as is his wife, is buried in the Webb Summit Cemetery, Perry County, Ohio. 1/

Jackson Terrell was born on August 5, 1828, in Ohio and married Isabella Darst (date of marriage and her parents' names are unknown). They were the parents of two daughters: Sarah Ann and Ella A. Jackson died on December 29, 1914, and is buried in the Polk City Cemetery, Polk City, Polk County, Iowa (as is his wife). 1/

Hiram Terrell (see below).

#### III. Hiram Terrell

Born on May 8, 1805, in Harrison County, [West] Virginia, and married Elizabeth Crossing (date unknown) in Ohio. She was born on September 26, 1811, in Ohio (parents' names unknown). Hiram and Elizabeth were the parents of 11 children: Reed, Jesse, Elizabeth, Gabriel, Mary Jane, Lucinda, Hulda Ann, Leander V., and Roanna, all born in Ohio, and Mariah, who was born in Iowa. (The name, birthdate, and sex of the eleventh child are unknown.) Hiram moved his family to Wapello County, Iowa, around 1849-50. He died on April 24, 1859, and his widow, Elizabeth, died on November 6, 1870, and both are buried in Chillicothe, Wapello County, Iowa. 1/

The 1850 census for Wapello County lists Hiram Terrell, aged 43; Elizabeth, aged 39, and the ten named children, who were aged between 15 years and one month. 2/

The 1860 census for Wapello County lists Elizabeth Terrell, aged 48, born in Pennsylvania [sic], with Gabriel, Lucinda, Hulda, Leander, Rhonah [sic], and Jesse. 2/ Elizabeth Terrell, aged 59, born in Ohio, and Jesse, aged 21, were listed in the 1870 census for Wapello County. 2/

[IV and V]. Further information on Hiram's descendants.

Nothing further is known about Reed Terrell.

Jesse Terrell was listed in the Wapello County, Iowa, censuses as aged 2 in 1850, aged 11 in 1860, and as a 21-year-old farmer living with his mother, Elizabeth, in 1870. 2/ He was said to have moved to Nebraska, married a Halley McCoy, and to have fathered ten children. 1/

Elizabeth Terrell was born on March 12, 1835, in Logan County, Ohio, and was married to William L. Fiehart of Sangamon County, Illinois, in 1853. They had six children: Sarah Amelia, Stephen Terrell, William Hiram, Elizabeth Ann, Belle, and Vinnie Mae. Elizabeth died on October 19, 1880, in Galesburg, Illinois, and is buried in Hope Cemetery. 1/

Gabriel Terrell was born around 1836-37 in Ohio and married a Nancy J. (date and her surname are unknown) who was born about 1839 in Ohio. They were the parents of four children: John B., Ada M., Amey D., and Joseph B. 2/ Gabriel died on October 28, 1871, and is buried in the Highland Cemetery, Eddyville, Wapello County, Iowa. 1/

Mary Jane Terrell was born around 1837-38 in Ohio. 2/ Nothing is known about her marital status. She is said to have died in 1916, possibly in Wapello County, Iowa. 1/

Lucinda Terrell ["Aunt Lucy Warner"] was born on December 15, 1839, in Logan County, Ohio. 1/ She was listed in the Wapello County, Iowa, censuses as aged 10 in 1850 and aged 20 in 1860. 2/ She was married to James Warner (date is unknown) and they had five children: Lee, Albert, Effie, Lucy, and Anna. 1/ Lucinda died on August 10, 1913, and is buried in Highland Cemetery, Eddyville, Wapello County, Iowa. 1/

Hulda Ann Terrell ["Aunt Hulda Shafer"] was born on March 14, 1843, in Logan County, Ohio. 1/ She was listed in the Wapello County, Iowa, censuses as aged 7 in 1850 and aged 17 in 1860. 2/ She was married to John P. Shafer (date is unknown) and they had three children: Charles, Amrose, and Hiram. 1/ Hulda Ann died on October 18, 1931, and is buried in Pleasant Corners Cemetery, Wapello County, Iowa. 1/

Roanna Terrell was born on November 17, 1846, in Logan County, Ohio. 1/ She was listed in the Wapello County, Iowa, censuses as aged 4 in 1850 and aged 13 in 1860. 2/ She was married to a Philip Stuber on February 25, 1869, and they had three children: Frank M., Charles N., and Lillian. 1/ The Wapello County, Iowa, censuses listed the children as Francis M., born March 1870; William M., aged 3 in 1880; and Charles, aged 1 in 1880. 2/ (William probably died when quite young and Lillian evidently was born after 1880.) Roanna died on January 26, 1899, and is buried in Highland Cemetery, Eddyville, Wapello County, Iowa. 1/

Mariah Terrell was listed in the 1850 Wapello County, Iowa, census as aged one month and as having been born in Iowa. 2/ (This was the only listing for Mariah; she evidently died quite young.)

Leander Terrell (see below)

#### IV. Leander Valentine Terrell

Born on February 14 (hence "Valentine"), 1845, in Chillicothe, Ross County, Ohio, and was brought to Wapello County, Iowa, by his parents around 1849-50. He served three years with Company B of the 7th Iowa Volunteer Cavalry in the Nebraska Territory and points west during the Civil War. Leander married Jennie Cecilia Sackett on November 7, 1872, (in Wapello County). She had been born on October 28, 1853, in Muncie, Indiana, to Alexander Thomas and Cornelia Clara (Gilbert) Sackett.

Leander and Jennie had eight children: Lenora Destia, Otis Truman, Mable Elizabeth, Irvin Clare, Mellie Cecilia, Edith Nina, John Putnam, and Walter Gilbert. Jennie died on February 21, 1915, and Leander died on August 8, 1926, and both are buried in Highland Cemetery, Eddyville, Wapello County, Iowa. 1/

The census for Wapello County listed Leander as aged 5 in 1850, aged 15 in 1860, as a 35-year-old farmer with a family in 1880, as a 55-year-old miller in Eddyville in 1900, and aged 65 in 1910. 2/ The censuses listed Jennie as Jane [sic], aged 6, in 1860, as a 17-year-old domestic servant for a farmer in 1870, and as the 26-year-old wife of Leander in 1880, as aged 46 in 1900 and aged 56 in 1910. 2/

A publication at the National Archives in Washington, D.C., that lists the rosters of the several Iowa volunteer cavalry units during the Civil War, shows that Leander enlisted in the 7th Iowa Volunteer Cavalry on April 5, 1863, was promoted through several grades of corporal to, on July 1, 1865, the rank of Fourth Sergeant, and was mustered out of service at Fort Leavenworth, Kansas, on May 17, 1866. (The same book shows that Alexander Sackett, the father of Jennie (Sackett) Terrell, enlisted in Company B of the 8th Iowa Volunteer Cavalry on August 5, 1863, and was taken prisoner near Newnan, Georgia, on July 30, 1864.) Family memory has it that Alexander Sackett died in a shipwreck (location unknown) on his way home to Iowa following the Civil War.

[IV, VI, and VII]. Further information on Leander's descendants:

Lenora Destia Terrell ["Aunt Nora"] was born on March 22, 1874, in Wapello County, Iowa, and, on March 13, 1898, was married to Jesse Ross, who was born on September 19, 1874, in Mahaska County, Iowa, to Jacob and Elizabeth (Cook) Ross. 1/ The Wapello County, Iowa, censuses list Lenora as aged 6 in 1880 and, in 1910, as the 30-year-old wife of Jesse Ross and the mother of Pearl, aged 7, and Paul, aged one year. 2/ Another son was born on September 10, 1901, and died two days later. 1/ Jesse died on September 20, 1949, and Lenora died April 24, 1963, and both are buried in West View Cemetery, Kirkville, Wapello County, Iowa. 1/

Pearl Ross, who was born on August 8, 1902, and died May 15, 1986, was married to Floyd A. Gallup on November 27, 1924. They were the parents of three daughters: Frances LaRue Gallup Goode, Vivian Lenora Gallup Newquist, and Orypha Luella Gallup Clark. 1/

Paul Ross, who was born on November 18, 1908, married Elizabeth Dawson on September 10, 1927. They were the parents of two children: Phyllis Darlene Ross Hawk and Donald Lavern Ross. 1/

Mable Elizabeth Terrell was born on June 28, 1877, in Dudley, Wapello County, Iowa, and, on March 12, 1899, was married to Charles A. Ross, who was born on November 10, 1877, in Kirkville, Wapello County, Iowa, to George H. and Rachel (Sears) Ross. 1/ The Wapello County censuses list Mable as aged 2 in 1880 and, in 1900, as the 21-year-old wife of Charles Ross and mother of Daisy, aged 3 months. 2/ Mable died on April 21, 1919, and Charles died on September 3, 1948, and both are buried in Highland Cemetery, Eddyville, Wapello County, Iowa. They were the parents of five children: Daisy Marie, Florence Alma, Elmer Earl, Jennie Elizabeth, and Ada Margaret. 1/

Daisy Marie Ross was born on February 4, 1900, and was married to William Tyler Lathrop on February 8, 1922. They were the parents of four daughters: Mable Louise Lathrop Strable, Mary Lois Lathrop Titus, Mildred Lucille Lathrop Michael, and Dorothy Helen Lathrop Baughman. 1/

Florence Alma Ross was born on July 19, 1901, and was married to Thomas Beecher Kerr on March 28, 1923. They had two daughters: Muriel Alma Kerr Burdock and Donna Eileen Kerr Johnson. 1/

Elmer Earl Ross was born on September 8, 1903, and married Pearl Allison on November 20, 1927. He was a career Navy man. They were the parents of two children: Shirley Louise Ross Hennafoord and Elmer Earl Ross, Jr. 1/

Jennie Elizabeth Ross was born on May 11, 1907, and was married to Reinhold Wellman Yeoman on November 24, 1926. They had two daughters: Cheryl Jean Yeoman Randolph and Colleen Coy Yeoman Slavson Green. 1/

Ada Margaret Ross was born on February 17, 1910, and died on February 22, 1931. She is buried in Highland Cemetery, Eddyville, Wapello Co., Iowa. 1/

Irvin Clare Terrell was born on October 16, 1879, in Wapello County, Iowa, and, on July 20, 1910, he married Emma Delpha Surber, who was born on October 18, 1889, to Henry Allen and Charlotte Bell (Jane) Surber. 1/ The Wapello County censuses list Irvin as 8 months old in 1890, as a 20-year-old farm laborer in 1900, and as a 30-year-old painter in 1910. 2/ Irvin and Delpha died within 24 hours of each other sometime in 1918 or 1919 (Irvin, who lived to be 99 years old, was a retired railroad worker. They are buried, it is believed, in Oskaloosa, Mahaska County, Iowa. They had one son, Earl Orlin. 1/

Earl Orlin Terrell was born on August 23, 1911, in Eddyville, Wapello County, Iowa, and, on June 5, 1953, married Mary Bieshaar, who was born on September 10, 1919, to Henry Ward and Bertha May (Parke) Bieshaar. They had no children. 1/ (Earl died in early 1986 and, it is believed, is buried in Oskaloosa, Iowa.

Mellie Cecilia Terrell was born on December 8, 1882, in Dudley, Wapello County, Iowa. She was never married. She taught school in Eddyville and, later, kept house for her younger, bachelor brother, Walter, at their parent's old home in Eddyville. 1/ The Wapello County censuses list Mellie as aged 17 and living with her parents in 1900 and as a 27-year-old school teacher living at home in 1910. 2/ Mellie died sometime in 1984 or 1985 at a nursing home in Albia, Monroe County, Iowa, and, probably, is buried in the Highland Cemetery in Eddyville.

Edith Nina Terrell was born on August 7, 1885, in Eddyville, Wapello County, Iowa, and was married on June 27, 1906, to William F. ("Uncle Willie") Hatfield of Lovilla, Monroe County, Iowa. 1/ The Wapello County census of 1900 lists Edith as aged 14 and living with her parents in Eddyville. The Monroe County census of 1910 lists William Hatfield as a 29-year-old barber living in Lovilla and lists Edith as his 24-year-old wife. 2/ They had three children: Ruth, Robert, and Wilma Jean. William died in August 1940 and Edith died on September 13, 1967, and both are buried in the Oak View Cemetery, Albia, Monroe County, Iowa. 1/

Ruth Hatfield was born on November 29, 1912, in Lovilla, Monroe County, Iowa, and was married to a man named Wolgemott (date and his given name are unknown), and is the mother of two sons and a daughter (names are unknown). Her last known residence was in Woodland, California. 1/

Robert Hatfield was born on October 3, 1917, in Lovilla, Monroe County, Iowa, and died on February 20, 1962, in California. He was married (his wife's name is unknown) and had two adopted sons. 1/

Wilma Jean Hatfield was born in Lovilla, Monroe County, Iowa (date is unknown). Her first husband, Kenneth Coleman, was killed in a plane crash, and she later was married to a man named Farrington (given name is unknown) and they were last known to be living in Reno, Nevada. It is not known if they had any children. 1/

John Putnam Terrell was born on June 9, 1888, in Eddyville, Wapello County, Iowa, and, on October 17, 1917, married Grace Shroyer, who was born on February 21, 1885, in Taintor, Mahaska County, Iowa, to James M. and Edna E. (Allen) Shroyer. 1/ The Wapello County censuses list John as aged 11 and living with his parents in 1900 and as a 21-year-old machinist living with his parents in 1910. 2/ Grace died on July 2, 1974, and is buried in New Sharon, Mahaska County, Iowa. John, a retired telephone company worker, lived in Oskaloosa, Iowa, until his death sometime in 1982 or 1983 (burial place is unknown, but probably is in New Sharon, Iowa). John and Grace had three children: Leatha Gale, John Putnam, Jr., and James Leander, who was born on October 12, 1921, and died on January 22, 1992. 1/

Leatha Gale Terrell was born in University Park, Mahaska County, Iowa, on September 26 (possibly in 1918), and was married on January 1, 1942, to George Taigenhorst, and they were last known to be living in Burbank, California. They have two children: Linda Gail and George, Jr. 1/

John Putnam Terrell, Jr. was born in University Park, Mahaska County, Iowa, on June 9 (possibly in 1919 or 1920). 1/ (He served with the U.S. Navy throughout World War II, having been stationed at Pearl Harbor on December 7, 1941.) He married Mary Pearce (date and her parents' names are unknown) and they have two children: Margaret Jeanne and Steven Pearce. 1/ (They were last known to be living in Lake Forest, Illinois.)

Walter Gilbert Terrell was born on March 12, 1894, in Eddyville, Wapello County, Iowa. 1/ The Wapello County censuses list Walter as aged 6 in 1900 and as aged 16 and living with his parents in 1910. 2/ Walter, who served in the U.S. Army during World War I, never married and was a school teacher in Eddyville until his death on December 23, 1950. He is buried in Highland Cemetery, in Eddyville. 1/

#### V. Otis Truman Terrell


Born in Dudley, Wapello County, Iowa, on October 22, 1875. He served with the 50th Iowa Volunteer Infantry during the Spanish-American War. He was hospitalized for two months with typhoid fever while stationed in Florida. 1/

Anne Thornton Terrell was born on July 23, 1955, in Washington, D.C. She is a special education teacher for the emotionally disturbed and lives in Arlington, Virginia

Patrick Selway Terrell was born on February 10, 1961, in Washington, D.C. On October 8, 1983, in Charlottesville, Virginia, he married Patricia Appleford, who was born on November 4, 1960, in Ann Arbor, Michigan, to John and Marguerite Appleford. Patrick works, in 1986, for the American Red Cross at its national headquarters in Washington, D.C. He and Patricia live in Arlington, Virginia.

They were living with Edith's mother, who was aged 62. 2/

[Rhoda (Gay, Clark, Selway) Culver was born in England (in Lancashire, it is believed) and was brought as an infant to the U.S. by her parents, who settled near Kalamazoo, Michigan.]

Otis and Edith had three children: Orpha Idelle, Paul Truman, and Gilbert Selway. Otis died in Des Moines, Polk County, Iowa, on December 31, 1964, and is buried in Glendale Cemetery there. 1/ Edith was, as of May 1986, a resident of the Polk City Manor (nursing home), Polk County, Iowa.

Orpha Idelle Terrell was born on March 19, 1910, in Eddyville, Wapello County, Iowa. On April 5, 1945, she was married to Charles Jackson, who died on July 3, 1963, and is buried in Glendale Cemetery, Des Moines, Iowa. Orpha later was married to Charles Wilcox, a native of Greene County, Iowa, who died on April 11, 1965, in Des Moines, Iowa, and is buried near his former home in Jefferson, Iowa. Orpha, who had no children, lives in Des Moines, Iowa, as of May 1986.

Paul Truman Terrell was born on April 4, 1912, in Eddyville, Wapello County, Iowa. On September 14, 1941, he married Eva Lila Gabrotsky, in Milwaukee, Wisconsin. They were the parents of two children: Judith Louise and Brian Selway. 1/ Eva, who was born on May 2, 1913, died in 1984 and is buried in the Los Angeles, California, area. As of 1986, Paul was living in Tustin, California.

Judith Louise Terrell was born on June 27, 1942, in Milwaukee, Wisconsin, and was married on June 27, 1964, in California, to Max David Benton. They have two daughters: Kim Marie and Kay Lea, and they live in Caleta, California. 1/

Erin Selway Terrell was born on September 14, 1948, in Milwaukee, Wisconsin. 1/ He is a Lutheran minister, and, in April 1966, he and his wife, Jan (maiden name is unknown) were transferred from Peewee Falls, Minnesota, to El Paso, Texas, with the four children: Scott Paul, Jon Carl, Kristin, and Audrey.

Gilbert Selway Terrell was born on September 12, 1913, in Avery, Monroe County, Iowa. He served in the U.S. Army Signal Corps from January 1941 to July 1945. On May 29, 1954, in Washington, D.C., he married Helen Marie Thornton, who was born November 13, 1919, in Albany, New York, to Joseph S. and Margaret (Hilton) Thornton. Gilbert and Helen have two children: Anne Thornton and Patrick Selway, and, as of May 1986, have lived in Arlington, Virginia, for 32 years.



## A reunion for 'family'

Descendants of slaves picnic at site where kin once toiled

CRESWELL, N.C. — On the same cypress-shaded plantation where his ancestors arrived in chains 200 summers ago, 80-year-old John Thomas Baum cleared his throat under his white straw hat Saturday and recited the slavery story he had heard as a child.

"He had to run from his master every time he went out," Baum said of his grandfather's efforts to court the girl he married.

"His master had a big dog that he'd go out and sic on him," the retired farmer suddenly added, straining to remember through the mists of the past.

Baum, who was born here in Creswell, revived such memories at the elegant site where they began — Somerset Place, once North Carolina's second-largest plantation, now a state park, and the scene Saturday of an extraordinary "family" reunion of hundreds of descendants of 21 slave families who worked the vast rice and corn estate from 1786 through the Emancipation.

Among those at the reunion were such descendants —

To find the people who met here Saturday, Redford worked forward from the first plantation inventory she found, for 1830, to the 1880 federal census, cross-checking through 450 death and marriage records.

A major stroke of luck was that the Collins family's records had been donated to the state archives. From the resulting wealth of overseers' correspondence, journals and meticulous accounts, Redford traced three generations of slave holders' rise and fall in the triangle of trade that sent sugar, rum and slaves among the United States, the West Indies and Africa.

She learned that Peter and Elsie lived to old age, giving birth to 11 children by 1839. She learned the locations of slave cabins and their numbers of occupants. She delved into a lost era of lavish parties and poetry readings held by Josiah III and his wife, Mary.

Most of all, Redford said, she learned about herself.

Many attending this reunion still have the names their ancestors took from their first owners— Littlejohn, Baum, Collins, Blount, Cabarrus, Palin, Phelps, & Revis.

Most interesting is the fact that the Collins Family's records had been donated to the SC State Archives and included overseers' correspondence, journals & meticulous accounts.

This demonstrates

the fact that archives and depositories frequently contain some very unusual records which are accessible to researchers who will take the time to ask.

## WSU budget Terrell's top priority

**PULLMAN (AP)** — Retiring Washington State University President Glenn Terrell says he will be too busy with matters concerning the university — particularly those before the Legislature — to have time for reminiscing during his final, typical 14-hour workdays.

"I want to see the conditions on campus free of problems that would impede the early efforts of the next president," said Terrell. "I don't want to leave anything really vexing behind."

"I will be ready to leave at the end of the day, June 30," added Terrell, who succeeded C. Clement French in 1967. "I've been getting myself ready for two or three years. That is why I've been so open about my retirement plans."

Terrell's top priority will be WSU's 1985-87 budget request of \$301.4 million in operating funds plus a 24.9-percent increase in faculty salaries — 10.9 percent to catch up and 14 percent to keep up with salaries paid at selected peer institutions.

However, former Gov. John Spellman recommended only \$260.5 million in operating funds and 8.17 percent faculty raises.

While Gov. Booth Gardner has given a verbal boost to higher education, Terrell still is waiting to see precisely how much of WSU's budget request will be

restored in the new governor's spending plan.

"Salary is the big money item," Terrell said, "and the most important. Just under \$100 million was involved in pay raise requests for all of higher education. Gov. Spellman recommended only one-third that much."

In a recent letter to Gardner, Terrell emphasized the seriousness of WSU's salary problem.

If faculty salary increases were held to 8.17 percent, he said, "we would end the biennium between 15 and 20 percent behind our competitors, substantially worse off than we are now."

"It may require some shifting of priorities to increase salaries," Terrell said. "But it does not require new taxes. It's all in where legislators put their priorities."

Vexed by a \$17,000 pay increase given Terrell during a closed Board of Regents meeting last summer, legislators have proposed everything from a limit on administrative raises to mandatory open salary discussions.

There are also bills proposing the merger of Washington State and Eastern Washington universities and increasing the power of the Council for Postsecondary Education.

Legislators, Terrell said, clearly want more control over higher education. But he says the legislation proposed does not reflect any sort of displeasure with the Pullman school.

"First, the salary thing has been laid to rest," he said. "I don't see that as hanging over us in any way. I was welcomed warmly in Olympia during my first trip over."

WSU's regents, by reducing Terrell's raise to \$6,000 for a total salary of \$94,840, got themselves

off the hook with legislators, said Terrell.

What remains, he said, is "the continuation of a trend toward increased control from Olympia — a trend I saw coming early in my career at Washington State University."

Creation of the Temporary Committee on Higher Education, then the Council on Higher Education and finally the Council for Postsecondary Education early in the 1970s was the first step.

"Then, in the last two or three years, legislators have decided that even that measure of oversight is insufficient," he said.

Terrell is reserving comment on specific legislation until later in the session, he said, but he did call for "some kind of authority that stands between the institutions and elected officials."

"We need a body that can differentiate roles and missions and cut down on these turf wars," he said. "It should be strictly, but strongly, advisory. A strong coordinating board."

WSU also will refrain from comment on specific merger plans with EWU until administrators have more time to gauge the mood of the Legislature, Terrell said.

## Finders Group Is Moving To Tallahassee

Tallahassee, Fla. (AP) — Members of the Finders, a small communal group from the Washington, D.C. area, believe they have found a "sign" that points the way to Tallahassee.

Two men from the group were arrested Feb. 4 for child neglect after they were found in a Tallahassee park with six youngsters, who were dressed in ragged clothes, insect-bitten and hungry.

"The Finders like to look for signs and symbols," said R. Gardner Terrell, 30, leader of the group believed to number fewer than 30 men, women and children.

"Tallahassee, or at least the state of Florida, has given us a symbol that they want us to be here since they kept several people here," he said March 2. "So we are just responding to the symbol and the rest of us are moving here also."

Douglas Ammerman, 27, and James Holwell, 23, remain in jail in lieu of \$10,000 bond. Also, one child remains in full custody of the Department of Health and Rehabilitative Services while a judge has ordered the agency to share custody of the other five youngsters with four women who claim to be their mothers.

"What I mean by Tallahassee wants some of us to be here is that they won't let them go," Terrell said referring to Ammerman and Holwell. "The women cannot

leave because the children are having a hearing next week."

Terrell, speaking in the park where the arrests were made, said six men in addition to the four women are already in Tallahassee.

He was not specific about how long the Finders would remain in this capital city, saying the group philosophy is to do everything one day at a time.

Terrell said the Finders are coming with the intention of creating goodwill, looking for jobs and pledging to donate half of their earnings to charity. He said there were no plans to seek new members here.

"Anybody could be a Finder just by starting to work together the way we work together," he said.

Terrell said authorities have offered the two jailed group members a plea bargain in which they would plead no contest to the charges. They are uncertain whether to accept the deal because it would involve the payment of a fine, which they do not want to pay because they believe they have done nothing wrong, Terrell said.

Police initially had described the Finders as a Satanic cult and feared the children might have been kidnapped. Later, authorities changed the description to that of a group living an alternate lifestyle.



### Terrell's bid for a no-hitter for Tigers ends with Joyner's hit

DETROIT — Walt Terrell, a blue-collar pitcher in a blue-collar town, came within one pitch of a classic piece of work Wednesday night.

Terrell pitched 8 1/2 hitless innings before California's Wally Joyner clearly doubled to right as the Detroit Tigers beat the Angels 3-0.

"I'm not disappointed," Terrell said. "I just wanted to win the game. This is probably not even my best game. I've had better stuff. The results were just better tonight, that's all."

Terrell, who said he threw a slider on the pitch that spoiled his bid for fame, finished with a one-hitter.

"I never really thought about it until there were two outs in the ninth," the easy-going Terrell said. "The crowd made some noise when I came out to start the inning, but our crowd always makes noise. It could have been the wave. They do that here, too."

Terrell said none of the players mentioned the possibility of a no-hitter to him. They did, however, talk of it among themselves.

Right fielder Kirk Gibson and shortstop Alan Trammell had a bet on it.

"When we took the field to start the ninth, I said to Tram, 'A buck, you choose,'" Gibson said. "Tram said he'd do it. I'd have put a buck to see him do it. Jeez. He just hung a slider with nothing on it."

Joyner's hit marked the second time this season that he had broken up a no-hit bid with a ninth-inning double. Joyner spoiled the try of Texas' Charlie Hough with a one-out double on June 16.

"I thought about the Hough game, not in the on-deck circle, but in the bottom of the eighth inning," Joyner said. "I went up to bat and I felt myself he was going to throw me an inside fastball."

"I didn't want to walk off the field knowing that I made the last out of a no-hitter. That would have been embarrassing. I was relieved a little bit. I knew it was a base hit right away."

Terrell, 11-9, had retired 16 straight batters when Joyner came up in the ninth. Joyner, a left-handed batter, pulled Terrell's first pitch into the right-field corner.

"I had already made up my mind to throw him a slider when (Jack) Howell had popped out," Terrell said. "I had pitched Joyner mainly fastballs away all night. I felt he would be looking away again."

"I'd throw the same pitch to him again — maybe a little more inside. You can't second-guess yourself. If you do that, you're not going to last in baseball."

Terrell, who doesn't even bother to ice down his arm after a game, considers himself just an ordinary pitcher.

"Guys like me just don't get the chance very often," Terrell said. "I just wanted to win. I don't have great velocity."

"As far as I'm concerned, I got a shutout. That's fine. A guy (Oakland's Mike Warren) pitched a no-hitter a few years ago and he's in the minor leagues."

"I'm a middle-class guy. Hopefully that will change and I'll make more money next year, but I'll still live the same."

The Angels had not come close to a hit prior to Joyner's double. The hardest-hit ball came in the sixth, when Joyner flied out deep to center field. In the seventh, first baseman Darrell Evans ranged to his right to grab a grounder by Doug DeCinces and threw to Terrell at first for the out.

Terrell, who walked three and struck out three, was trying to become the first pitcher to throw a no-hitter in the major leagues since Mike Witt of California pitched a perfect game against Texas on Sept. 30, 1984.

The right-handed Terrell got a warm reception from the crowd of 22,755 when he took the mound in the ninth. He retired Gary Pettis on a routine fly to left and set down Jack Howell on a popup before Joyner's hit.

Terrell finished with his ninth complete game of the season. John Candelaria, 6-2, took the loss.

The Tigers broke a scoreless tie in the seventh on a walk to Darnell Coles, a sacrifice, and RBI singles by Evans and Mike Heath.

Alan Trammell hit his 12th home run of the season in the eighth inning, off reliever Doug Corbett.

California's only threat came in the fourth when Terrell walked Howell leading off the inning and then walked Reggie Jackson with one out. DeCinces followed by hitting into a forceout, sending Howell to third, and Terrell ended the inning by retiring George Hendrick on a routine fly to left.

Terrell did not allow a runner after the walk to Jackson until Joyner doubled.

The game was Terrell's first appearance against the Angels this season. Last year, Terrell's first in the American League, he was 0-2 against California with an earned run average of 8.25 — his highest against any AL opponent.

## TERRELL 'JOT'EM DOWN STORE'

In 1933, L. C. Terrell opened a country store at Russell Cave and Ironworks (KY) pikes. Since Terrell and his brother, Ed Terrell, enjoyed listening to one of America's all-time favorite radio shows, "Lum & Abner," they began to call each other Lum and Abner and named some of their regular customers for other characters in the show.

About 1938, two men visiting nearby horse farms walked into the grocery store and said they'd heard how much the Terrells and their customers enjoyed the "Lum & Abner" show.

They went into Lexington, bought a sign and had it painted to read: "Jot'Em Down Store," then returned and gave the sign to the Terrells. The two men were Chester LAUCK and Norris GOFF — Lum and Abner.

Today, nearly 50 years later, you'll still find that same 'Jot 'Em Down Store,' now run by L. C. Terrell's son, Robert Terrell. He still displays autographed photos of the real Lum and Abner in his father's store.
