OPERATION HARDCOPY UPDATE

Before listing the additions to the Terrell Collection, U S A, I feel a need to expand on some of the items listed in Vol II #3, since I have had a few requests from members wanting to see copies of these items. I have advised those requesting such that we can copy anything in the Collection for \$.20 per page, ie, 30 pages \$6.00, but books of 150 or more pages could be out of reach of the average member. With this in mind, discussions are taking place about the possibility of creating

a 'lending library' where a copy could be obtained for slightly more than postage costs for a period of time, probably 2 weeks and no more than one month. Please bear with us and we will seek the best solution possible with the funds and volunteers available.

The Terrell works in the Collection were created generally in the following order:

Genealogy of the Terrell Family 1883 by Gen. William Henry Harrison Terrell (#84, p. 88) appears to be the earliest effort to establish a book on the surname in the USA; has been incorporated into later works.

Genealogical Notes of the Tyrrell and Terrell Family of Virginia and its English and Norman Progenitors by Edwin Holland Terrell, San Antonio, TX, 1907 contains info gathered while he was ambassador to Holland in England, has a 1909 sequel which is not yet officially in the Collection; both, 1907 & 1909 materials have been incorporated into later works.

Richmond, William, and Timothy Terrell Colonial Virginians by Celeste Barnhill 1934, 339 pages including index, appears to be the first widely published work on the surname and draws heavily from information contained in the two previous works (see below).

The Terrell Family by Nellie F. Ayres, 1946, draws heavily upon the preceding works and adds info specific to her line, John Terrell of NC. (#7, p86)

Terrell Genealogy by Emma Dicken, 1953, San Antonio TX appears to be the most comprehensive work to date on the surname in the USA and incorporates most of the information in ALL of the preceding works. (#13, p86)

Genealogy of Terrell-Willis-Kistner-Meier-Harris by Helen A. Meier Smith, Amarillo, TX is a recent addition and I have not had time to study it thoroughly, but it appears to deal mainly with a Tennessee to Texas line, with some general background, appears to contain some information not in Dicken. (#85, p 89)

Terrell & Carruth Genealogy by John H. Parker of Liberty, MS is also a new addition which appears to deal with a line that emigrated from VA through AL and MS westward; indexed, appears to contain some info missed by Dicken. (#86, p 89)

The Terrell Family Heritage Book by Beatrice Bayley, Inc., 1981 contains

absolutely no specific ancestral info; instead is a book of general information on researching your ancestry with a mailing list of over 1500 families with the TERRELL surname but none of the other variations; 300 of these have received invitations to join resulting in less than ten new members but did lead to the priceless discovery and copying of the original works of Gen W H H Terrell. (#8, p86)

We hope this extremely brief critique will assist you in deciding which works would be of most benefit in your research.

1987 TERRELL REUNION DATE AND SITE: The Fourth annual reunion of the TERRELL SOCIETY OF AMERICA, INC. has been set for the last Saturday (31st.) in October 1987 at Unicoi Lodge in Unicoi State Park near Helen, GA, approximately 35 miles north of Gainesville, GA. We have been advised that we reserve 25 rooms in the inn under an agreement whereby each family may make its own reservation. However, there is possibility of a slight rate increase April 1, 1987 and we will not have applications and contract until the spring or summer issue.

The lodge is arranged in buildings consisting of 10 rooms upstairs and 10 downstairs. The downstairs rooms sleep 4. The upstairs rooms sleep 6; but two have to be young enough to climb a ladder to a loft--ideal for families with teenagers & children. Those who have problems which prevent climbing stairs should specifically request ground floor rooms, and those who have no difficulty with stairs should be courteous enough to request upper level rooms. Each building has a large common living room type area with fireplace. We have been advised that the lodge does not provide meeting facilities on weekends in October, but if we reserve

a complete building, we will have total access to the living area for our meeting. Rooms may be rented either single, or for any number up to 4 or 6. The 1986 rates are \$40.00 single and \$5.00 for each additional person. I was told that the anticipated increase would be slight, possibly only \$5.00 per night, but we won't know until April. The lodge features a buffet three times per day, so you ladies won't have any food to cook, beds to make, or carpets to vacuum, Hoo-rah!!!!

In addition to the Lodge, Unicoi park has some 1, 2, and 3 bedroom cabins and hundreds if not thousands of campsites ranging from primitive to motor home type. Therefore we are not limited to the 124-130 persons that can be housed in the 25 lodge rooms, but we do need to fill at least 20 rooms in the lodge to get use of the living area. Details on these additional facilities will be included in a future issue.

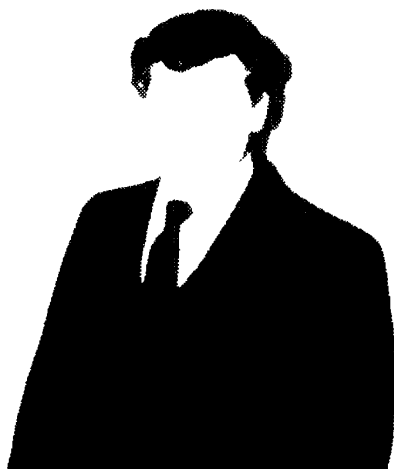
Park attractions include many miles of hiking trails, a lake, one waterfall, all situated in the colorful and peaceful north Georgia mountains.

Nearby attractions include a state park with miles of hiking trails, waterfalls; Brasstown Bald, highest point in the area; a fish hatchery; huge flea market; Helen, GA has been redecorated as a Bavarian Village with Chalet motif and offers numerous attractions ranging from a wax museum depicting life in semi-rural Georgia at the turn of the century to glass blowing, candle and candy making, etc.--in addition, Octoberfest is held for the entire month of October with special events depicting European customs, dress, and foods; the surrounding area is dotted with such attractions as a water powered grist mill, Norweign specialty country store, old homes converted into bed and board inns offering a variety of foods; artists specializing in items ranging from stained glass to pottery. A pre-reunion ADVISORY COMMITTEE meeting has been suggested for those who can come up at least 2 days prior to the reunion to review the past, present, and to make recommendations for the future of the TERRELL SOCIETY to be presented to the general membership attending the reunion and to those who cannot attend via *Trails*. If you can and will attend this advisory meeting, please let us know as soon as possible. In any event, you have the date and

place so that you can make your plans. Access to out of state members in addition to driving all the way is easiest by flying into Atlanta and renting a car to drive approximately 120 miles to Illinois. If enough are flying in and will advise us, we might be able to arrange a chartered van or bus at a nominal per-person rate. 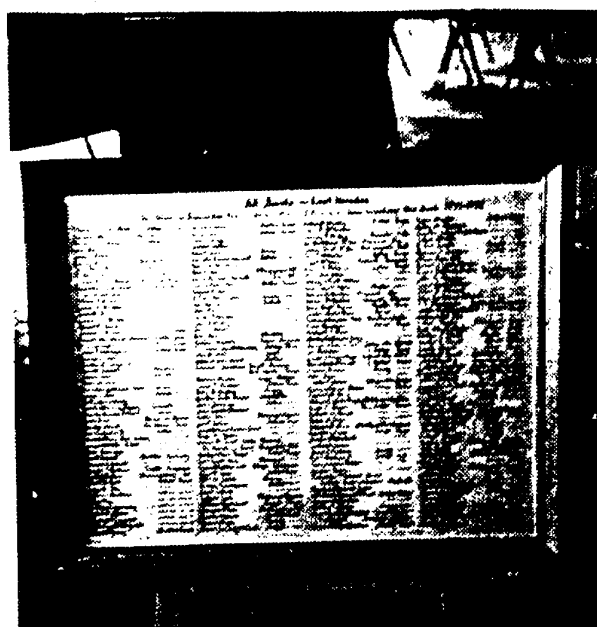

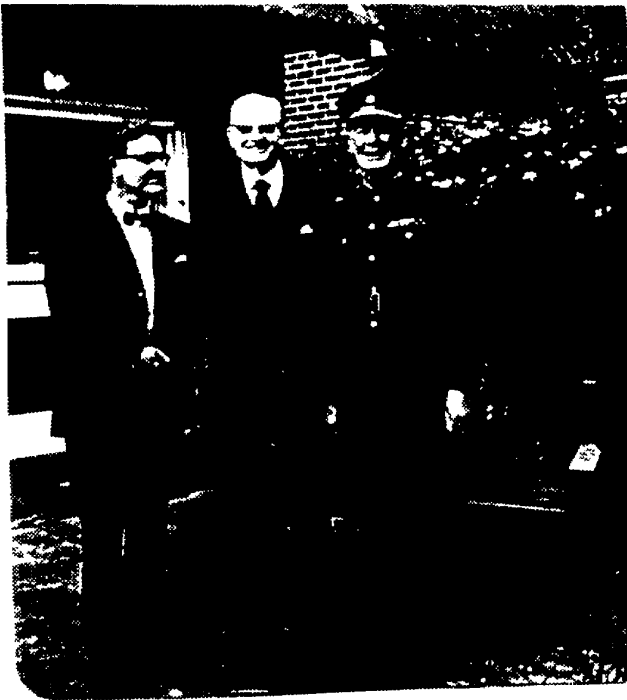

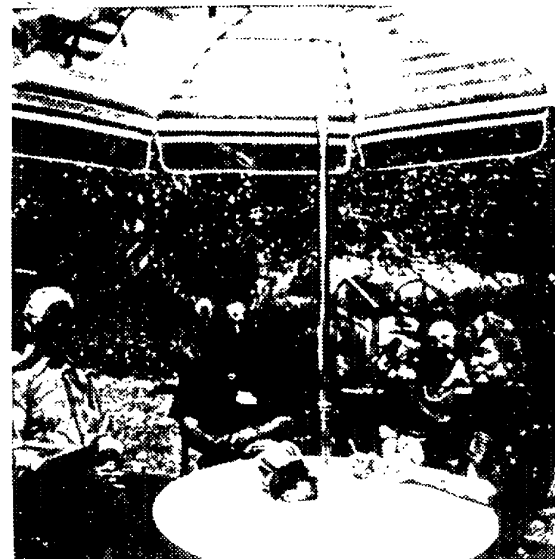
