## BOARD APPROVES CHANGES

The board of directors has approved five changes that we hope will benefit you.

### 1. ADDRESS

The official address of the society has been changed to:

This change applies to all correspondence and matters EXCEPT the LENDING LIBRARY (including back issues of TRAILS) which will retain the former address as long as Mrs. Pat Walker desires to continue providing that service.

The official corporate address had been that of our treasurer in Jonesboro, GA. Her resignation made it necessary to secure another address within the state of Georgia because the state department of corporations requires a Georgia address.

Part of most correspondence ends up on Dan's desk anyway due to either queries, lineage data, or requests for specific info. We feel that this change will reduce time lag. Implementation of change #5 below will make the need to reduce lag even more acute.

Our ad in the GENEALOGICAL HELPER will be changed to include this address.



## 2. LIFETIME MEMBERSHIP

A new membership category, LIFETIME MEMBERSHIP, has been authorized and will be added to forms when updated supplies are printed.

For this purpose, LIFETIME is defined as the life of the member or the life of the Society, whichever is shorter.

The fee for a LIFETIME MEMBERSHIP is set at ten times the annual renewal rate. Initially, this will be \$150.00.

If you have difficulty remembering whether you renewed your subscription to TRAILS, a lifetime membership will eliminate the need to remember annual renewals.

Lifetime memberships are available now. Simply indicate LIFETIME on your renewal form and enclose \$150.00.

## 3. FREE LIFETIME MEMBERSHIP

The board voted to grant a FREE LIFETIME MEMBERSHIP to each officer of the Society, past, present, and future.

In comparison to the hours of service rendered, this amounts to a mere "tip." However, it is a way of expressing appreciation for services rendered. Also, we hope it will be an incentive to serve in the future.

In order to prevent this from appearing self-serving, this item will be included on the ballot with the new officer nominations for your approval or rejection in the spring.

## 4. FREE LIFETIME MEMBERSHIP FOR SERVICE

The board voted themselves the power to grant a FREE LIFETIME MEMBERSHIP to anyone who performs a voluntary service for the Society that involves long hours and/or extraordinary effort.

The power to determine what services qualifies for a FREE LIFETIME MEMBERSHIP shall remain with the board and not be open to challenge by any individual member.

This may seem redundant. The board could use this to grant a LIFETIME MEMBERSHIP to a board member (officer) as well as to others.

However, if we are to achieve our goal of being able to spread data electronically, someone besides your editor is going to have to spend some long hours typing lending library selections and other items into computers then forwarding the diskettes for inclusion in our archive.

We hope this will encourage some members to volunteer to assist us.

Due to the possibility that this could be used for board members, this item will also be included on the future ballot for your approval or rejection.

## 5. MEMBERSHIP DRIVE

We have never made a serious direct mail membership drive. We have existed by a combination of advertising in the *GENEALOGICAL HELPER*, free blurbs in *GENEALOGICAL COLUMNS*, and word of mouth.

We now have a list of over 15,000 potential members who have the name TERRELL in some variation either as a surname or a given name. This list has been compiled from genealogical books of questionable merit that include name and address listings, pages of phone books that members have sent over the past few years, etc. The list isn't the most accurate, but it's all we have.

Beginning next year, we plan to start soliciting these prospects with the offer of a free sample of *TRAILS*. Initially, the free issue will be a back issue that we have on hand now.

We will continue this practice until all have been solicited, or until statistics prove the project won't return the expense in new memberships.

In order to be able to mail the sample issues along with regular *TRAILS*, we will revert to our original practice of 4 quarterly mailings per year.

## PRINTER WOES

The printer that I paid \$1800 for in 1988 has developed terminal cancer. The printer was supposed to be good for 50,000 pages, but began showing serious problems after only 8,000. Estimates to repair it exceed \$450.00.

Technological improvements and mass production now make it possible to get a 600 dpi (dots per inch) printer for about \$750.00. My printer is 300 dpi and was top of the line in 1988. Photographs have reproduced poorly on my printer. A new one would make future photos 4 times as good as those we have been printing.

Until funds and approval are available for a new printer, I will continue to limp along with this one. However, there will be as much "cut and paste" material as possible used in each issue to stretch whatever life is left in this printer.

## ELECTRONIC INDEX PROGRESSING

This has been a hectic year for me. The new 500mb hard disk is installed in the computer along with a 14,400K modem.

The electronic index for Vols I - X is entered in the database phase and has been converted to ASCII text about half way.



We intend to make these indexes available on IBM Compatible 360K or 1.2 meg 5 1/4" diskettes and/or 1.44 meg or 720K 3 1/2" diskettes.

We will attempt to maintain an E-Mail address at the editor's home so that those of you who have E-Mail can get your index via that method. This will overcome our inability to write Apple or Macintosh diskettes. Maybe we have at least one member with each of these who will volunteer to accept a copy of the index via either modem or E-Mail and make it available in the proper format to those who need it at a nominal copy cost.

My librarian has informed me that the post office for this part of the state will be moved from Milledgeville, GA to the Roddenberry Memorial Library here in Cairo shortly after the first of the year. That move will necessitate a change in my E-mail address. I'll post the new address in the Spring issue.

## TERRELL/WILKINS

### SIMPSON BOBO WILKINS

A native and life-long resident of Spartanburg County, the late **Simpson Bobo WILKINS** spent practically his entire life in the town of his birth, Cowpens. Only during the last two years prior to his death was he a resident of Spartanburg, where he had important business, financial, and property interests.

At Cowpens, Mr. WILKINS had been successfully and extensively engaged for many years in farming, a flour mill, and a sawmill. He was known as one of the most successful and largest planters, merchants, and lumbermen in this section of South Carolina and for many years was also an important figure in banking circles. His integrity, his ability, and his public spirit had gained him an enviable reputation and had made for him a large number of friends.

The WILKINS family is of great antiquity in ENGLAND. It was founded in this country by three brothers--**Peter Andrew**, **Thomas**, and **John WILKINS**, all sons of Captain **Robert WILKINS** of the English Navy and his wife, **Margaret HUBBARD**, of Essex, England. Thomas & John WILKINS settled in upper Norfolk County Virginia in 1637.

The direct ancestor of Simpson Bobo WILKINS, **Peter Andrew WILKINS**, came to Virginia in the seventeenth century and died there in 1648. The line is traced through: son, **William WILKINS**; grandson, also **William WILKINS**; great grandson, **Robert WILKINS** who d. in VA 1735, m. 1719 **Bridger[t?] HAYNIE** (a dau. of **Richard HAYNIE**, Sr. member of the House of Burgesses of VA); gg grandson, **John WILKINS** b. Gloucester or Northampton County, VA, 1720 (member of the Safety Committee in Northampton Co. VA 1775-76) m. 1745 **Elizabeth HAYNIE** (dau. **Richard HAYNIE**, Jr, grand dau. **Richard HAYNIE**, Sr); ggg grandson, **William WILKINS** (b.



Simpson Bobo WILKINS

Northampton County VA 05/24/1746, d. in SC 04/02/1807, bur. Spartanburg County) m. **Elizabeth TERRELL** (06/10/1756--12/25/1820) at "Richlands" (plantation of **Anthony HAYNIE**) in Culpeper County VA; gggg grandson **John Terrell WILKINS** (dates not listed) m. **Elizabeth BROWN** (dates not listed) & they parented **Simpson Bobo WILKINS** at Cowpens, Spartanburg County, SC on 08/13/1854.

The lineage of **Elizabeth TERRELL** lists her as daughter of Capt. **William TERRELL** & **Mary MALLORY** (William b. Orange Springs, Orange Co. VA 1733, d. after 1780, was vestry man of St Mark's Parish, Culpeper Co. VA as late as 1780); granddaughter of Captain **Robert TERRELL** & **Mary FOSTER** (Robert b. 1688, descended from [article does not say "son of"] **William TERRELL** (b. 1635 in England, d. 1727 New Kent Co. VA) m. 1659 **Susannah WATERS** in NY. Family tradition says **Susannah** was dau of **William WATERS**, Earl of Richmond and Liverpool, a member of the Roman Catholic Church, who objected to his daughter's marriage to a Protestant. Converted by her future husband to the Protestant Episcopal Faith, she married in spite of her father's objections. **William TERRELL** was the son of Capt. **John TERRELL** and his wife Lady **Ann JOHNSTON**, a niece of Lord **ASHLEY**, Lord Proprietor of North Carolina. Capt. **John TERRELL** was a captain in the Royal British Navy and was Lord Proprietor of the holdings of the Earl of Shaftesbury in the Colony of South Carolina. He was killed in 1692 at the battle of Newport in Flanders and never came to America to see his domain. [Either that death date is a misprint, or he was nearly 80 years old when he participated in the battle if he sired William in 1635. DFB]

By marriage, the WILKINS family became allied with numerous other prominent Colonial families, including **LIPSCOMB**, **KIRBY**, **RAGLAND**, **BEAUFORT**, & **McGEE**.



**William WILKINS** served in the Revolutionary War, enlisted on 08/12/1779 in Capt. **Thomas BALLARD'S** company, 10th N C Regt. under Col. **Abraham SHEPARD**. He was made a lieutenant in 1780 and later a captain in the militia. According to family traditions he was also an Independent Ranger and Indian fighter with **Adam GOUELOCK**. After the end of the Revolutionary War, he took up a large acreage of land in Spartanburg County, SC, but in his old age, he returned to Rutherford County NC where his son was a member of the House of Representatives.

**Simpson Bobo WILKINS** was educated in the public grammar and high schools of his native region. In early life, he engaged in farming and the mercantile business. He acquired large agricultural holdings which he managed with outstanding success and unusual ability for many years. A number of years before his death, he disposed of most of his plantation by will to his children except for 1500 acres which he retained until his death. He invested in real estate holdings in Spartanburg to which he moved about 2 years before his death.

During his long residence in Cowpens, he engaged in the general merchandise business, operated a flour mill and a sawmill. He dealt on a large scale in lumber. He furnished all the lumber used in the construction of Converse College. He organized the Security Bank of Cowpens and served as its president for many years. He was director of the Central National Bank of Spartanburg and a large stockholder in other financial institutions of Spartanburg.

In Cowpens, he was one of the most active members and the most generous supporters of the Baptist Church. In Spartanburg, he attended Central Methodist Church.

Mr. **WILKINS** married twice. By his first wife (not named), he was the father of several children including: 1. **William WILKINS** of Tryon NC; 2. **John WILKINS** of Goucher; 3. Mrs. **William POTTER**, wife of a well known wholesale grocer of Spartanburg & Cowpens; & 4. Mrs. **William MOORE**, a resident of Cowpens.

Mr. **WILKINS** md. (2) 04/26/1905 at Woodruff SC to **Mary Kate SWINK**, dau. of **Jesse L. SWINK & Margaret BISHOP**. By the second marriage, he had one daughter, **Catherine B. WILKINS** who was b. 10/11/1907 and is a graduate of Hollins College in VA.

**Simpson Bobo WILKINS** died 05/09/1922 at his home at 350 East Main St. in Spartanburg SC. He was in his 68th year and had a prolonged illness. Funeral services were held at his residence. The remains were then taken to Cowpens where services were held in the local Baptist Church. Both services were conducted by Dr. **W. B. BALL**, pastor of the First Baptist Church of Spartanburg. Mr. **WILKINS** was laid to rest in the Cowpens Cemetery. His memory will long be cherished by all who had the privilege of knowing him and most by those who knew him best.

In addition to his widow and children, he was survived by one brother, **Ball WILKINS**, president of Mary Louise Mills, and by several sisters.

Mrs. **Mary Kate SWINK Wilkins** was the daughter of a prominent planter and a veteran of the War Between the States where he served in the Confederate Army. She belongs to an old and prominent southern family dating back to Colonial days. She is eligible to membership in the Colonial Dames and is a member of the Daughters of the American Revolution and of the Spartanburg Woman's Club. After her husband's death, she continued to live in the residence. [Apparently she was still alive in 1934 when this book was printed.]

## GENEALOGY? ASK DAN!

Q. I am a historian, not a genealogist. The origin of names does have a historical significance. The surnames **TORELL** and **TORRELL** appear to be of Latin origin, both Italian and Spanish. The **TARRELLS** are septs to the **MacINTOSH** clan of Scotland according to the records in Edinburgh. The **THAR**, **THER**, **THOR** & **THUR** variations are of Viking origin.

Three decades before the Christian era, **Augustus** increased the number of Roman legions from 27 to 37 and they were spread over most of Europe and Asia Minor resulting in Latin names coming down to modern times out of many non Latin nations.

**Milesius**, first king of Ireland, was born in Spain and is of royal Scythian descent. His second wife was **Scota**, daughter of **Nectanebus**, Pharaoh of Egypt (ca 1800 BC). **Scota** is the origin of the word and term "Scot." The Irish referred to themselves as "Scots" long before their invasion of Scotland. In the third century AD, **Carbri Riada** went to the extreme northeast part of Ireland and set a kingdom of Scot colonists in Antrim called **Dal Riada**. He then took some of his people across the Irish Sea to what is now Argyll and established a second **Dal Riada**. This was referred to as Scottish **Dal Riada** and after the native Picts were subdued, the area was called "Scotland." The Picts came from Thrace about 1700 BC.



Patterns form from age and migration. For example, "asti" in Sanskrit changed to: "esti" in Greek; "est" in Latin; "ist" in German; and "is" in English. This is an example of the migration and phonetic change of the verb, "is."

I am still confused as to the list of **TERRELL** variations being associated together. Many have different origins and are not related to the same family simply because of any phonetic similarity. *JT NC*

**A.** To the best of my knowledge, no one in the **TERRELL SOCIETY** has suggested that those whose names are spelled (T,TH)?(R,RR)?(L,LD,LL) are from the same origin or even related because of the phonetic similarity of the names.

Not everyone who spells their name **TYRRELL** or **TERRELL** descended from the early immigrants to either New England or to Virginia. Some persons with these names arrived here at different intervals and some are probably still arriving today.

The historical events that you cited so well in so few words occurred prior to the establishment of the colonies. Therefore, those events helped to influence those coming here to the "melting pot."

Prior to the establishment of public education in the late nineteenth century, less than 5% of the population could read and write. The few who could were the ones who wrote wills, deeds, Bible records, and other instruments for those who could not. Because these persons probably did not know either the origin or the proper spelling of their name, the writers spelled the names phonetically as they understood them.

For example, Rev. **William DOUGLAS** of Virginia (creator of the famous *DOUGLAS REGISTER*, a diary containing notes on births, deaths, and marriages of his parishioners) spelled **TERRELL** three or four different ways (sometimes for children of the same parents) before his daughter married into the family and he learned that the proper English spelling was **TYRRELL**.

The various spellings are not lumped together because of either blood or origin of spelling. They are lumped together because one never knows which of these variations may have been assigned to his or her ancestor at any point in history. If one overlooks a variation, he risks missing an ancestor. *DFB*

Want descendants, migration, & other information on **Robert TERRILL** b. 12/18/1751 in VA, son of **Robert TERRILL** & **Judith TOWLES**.

Also want ancestors and siblings of **Edmund TERRILL** b. ca1775-84 of Madison Co. KY, d. Lawrence Co. IN before 12/10/1828 and his spouse **Sarah STEPHENSON** b. 1776-80 at VA or KY, d. at Lawrence Co. IN after 1830; md. 03/25/1794 at Madison Co. KY, Marriage Book Vol 1, page 42. I know this is not the son of **Robert** & **Judith TOWLES TERRILL**.

In the book, *Genealogy-TERRILL ... HARRIS* by **Helen Meier Smith**, on pgs. 30 & 33, she states that **Edmund TERRILL** md. first **Mary MAXWELL** and second **Elizabeth JONES** and died in TN. She also lists the children of each wife.

On my trip to KY, I found the will of **Thomas MAXWELL** listing his daughter **Mary** as the wife of Major **Edmund TERRILL**.

But in Garrard Co. KY, Circuit Court Chancery suits, Book 3 pg. 236, dated Jan 1809, I found another court record of **Edmund TERRILL**. The suit listed **John TERRILL** against the **TERRILL** heirs for the partition of land of **Edmund TERRILL**, deceased, listing the partition of his land between: **Allen WALLACE** and **Nancy**; **Henry P BUFORD** & **Betsy**; **John TERRILL**; **James TERRILL**; **Oliver TERRILL**; **Lucy TERRILL**; **Mariam TERRILL**; **Towles TERRILL**; & **Polly TERRILL**. These are the same children that were listed as being of the family of **Edmund** living in TN at a much later date.

Apparently the TN **Edmund** is yet another **Edmund**. ## Who Was George J. Turrell?

Perhaps some reader can help solve the mystery of George J. Turrell. The June 1994 edition of *Bank Note Reporter* (a hobby newspaper) featured a photo of a handbill printed and distributed by George J. Turrell, a shoe dealer trading at 922 Pacific Avenue, Tacoma, Washington Territory.



The fantasy \$3 note replicates features from \$5 United States note of 1862. The reference to "WT" (Washington Territory) indicates that the handbill was issued before statehood in 1889.

But, who was George J. Turrell? He could not be found in the Washington Territory/State census of 1860, 1870, 1880, 1890 (reconstructed), or 1900; nor could he be found in the 1880 mortality census. He apparently passed through Washington very quickly.

We have all struggled with the problem of missing ancestors. Here is one Turrell who sought publicity and recognition with his handbill, but seems to have left no other footprints in the sands of time.

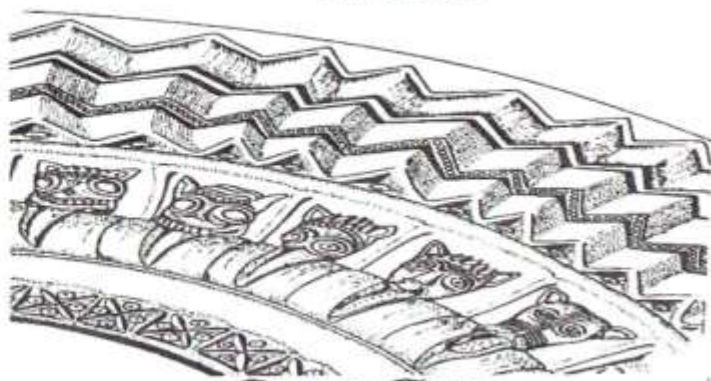

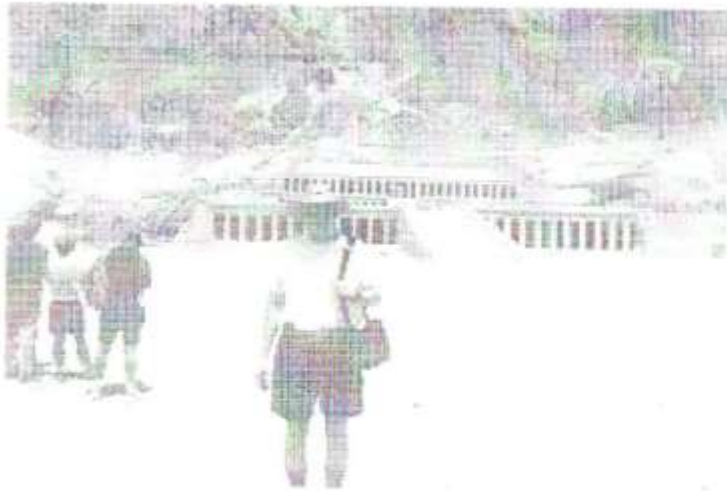

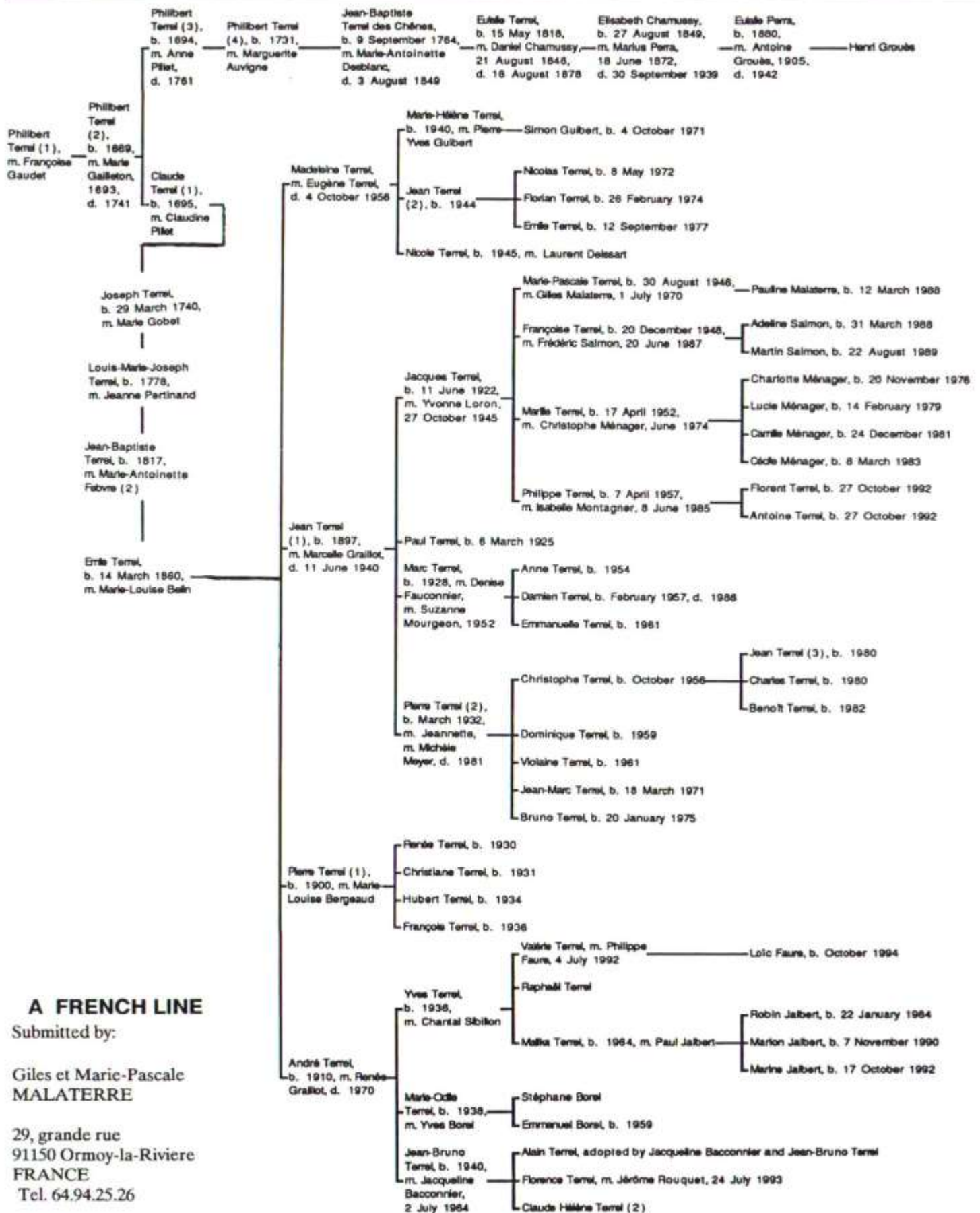

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## Sir Walter Tyrrell and the Killing of King William 2nd

Certainly one of the most extraordinary historical distinctions which can be claimed by any family belongs to the Terrell/Tyrrell (etc.) family. One of this family's earliest known ancestors put himself into the pages of history when, on August 2nd 1100, he **accidentally** killed the King of England.

### The Cast

Sir Walter Tyrrell (or Tirel) 3rd, Lord of Poix, was the grandson of Sir Walter Tyrrell 1st who had been part of William the Conqueror's invading army that had defeated the English at the Battle of Hastings in 1066. Tradition says that Sir Walter 1st had led one of the columns in the first assault. Sir Walter 3rd himself had participated in the First Crusade and was present at the Siege of Jerusalem in 1096. The Tyrrells were part of the Norman nobility, and their access to the King had continued through several generations.

William II, son of William the Conqueror and King of England, assumed the throne in 1087. His full name was William Rufus ("the red"), and he was the 17th sovereign to sit on the throne since Alfred the Great. (Elizabeth II is the 54th monarch.) Of all these, he was the most immoral and cruel king to ever rule England. He is said by his court clerks, who were the historical media, to be a repulsive red-haired, short, bull-necked fat man who stammered when he became excited, as he often did. He was rude, and shouted at people in a bullying manner. Upon assuming the throne, he was immediately confronted with a revolt of the Norman barons who supported his older brother Robert's (Duke of Normandy) claim to the crown. William promised to relieve the English from oppression, and to relax the severity of the hated Forest Laws in exchange for the support of the people. He got that support and put down the rebellion. But, then he broke his promises to his English supporters, and instead of relaxing the Forest Laws he made them more severe. His father had created the New Forest by forcibly driving the Saxons from their lands. Some historians have cited incidents to prove that Rufus could at times be noble and less savage than his father, but most see him as an ill-tempered despot.

William would resort to any means to obtain money. He permitted his chief minister, whom he appointed Bishop of Durham, to impose heavy taxes on the people, both rich and poor; he kept bishoprics vacant for years in order to appropriate the revenues for himself; and he pardoned criminals who paid

him bribes. He allowed the soldiers of his own bodyguard to loot and rape and maltreat the people in the districts through which they passed. Rufus had no sympathy for Christianity and openly ridiculed the Church. His attitude threatened the position of the clergy, who held political as well as spiritual power. His policies and manner had made for him many enemies, many of them in high places.

Said the *Anglo-Saxon Chronicle* for the year 1100 (trans. G.N. Garmonsway, Dent, 1960):

He was very strong and fierce to his country and his men and to all his neighbors, and very terrible. And because of the counsels of wicked men, which were always agreeable to him, and because of his avarice, he was always harassing this nation with military service and excessive taxes, for in his days all justice was in abeyance.

In spite of the King's evil reputation, Sir Walter Tyrrell 3rd, common ancestor to all present-day Terrells, was his personal friend and companion. Sir Walter also enjoyed the reputation of being one of the finest archers in the Kingdom.

### The Killing of the King

On the fateful day of August 2nd, the King, Prince Henry (afterwards King), Sir Walter Tyrrell, Earl Gilbert and Roger de



Clare (Sir Walter's brothers-in-law), Robert fitz-Harmon, Baron Gilbert de Laigle, Baron William de Monfichet, and William of Breteuil, and other courtiers decided to hunt deer in the New Forest.

A Forest is a woodland district, usually belonging to a King, set apart for hunting wild beasts and game, having its own laws and officers and is basically Crown land, which is true today of the New Forest in Hampshire.

That morning, the King was made a gift of six new arrows of superior quality. He gave two of them to Sir Walter saying "The best arrows for the best shot". They hunted until early evening. As the sun was setting, a deer ran from the bushes.

There are slightly conflicting stories about what happened next. However, the outcome was that King William II Rufus at about 7:15 pm on August 2, 1100, met an untimely end at age 44 in a forest near Minstead.

The monkish chronicler of the period William of Malmesbury described the event in his *Gesta Regum* (Rolls Series, ed. W. Stubbs, 1889):

After dinner, in the evening of the second of August in the year Eleven Hundred, the King rode into the Forest with a few companions to hunt deer. The party split up in the woods, and the King was left alone with Walter Tirel.

The sun was setting when a stag passed near by; and the King, drawing his bow, loosed an arrow which hit the mark but failed to kill. Slightly wounded, the animal ran off to the west whilst the King watched intently for some time, raising a hand to shield his eyes against the rays of the sun.

Just then another stag passed by. Tirel shot at it and missed; but the arrow flew on and, by mischance, struck the King beyond. Clutching at the shaft where it protruded from his breast the King fell forward, breaking the arrow in his body as he hit the ground and dying instantly without having uttered a word.

Whether Sir Walter killed the King or not (accidently or not), he certainly fled for Poole on the southern coast. He crossed the ford at Avon (known thereafter as Tyrrells Ford) and at Avon village he stopped and had a local blacksmith reverse his horse shoes to confuse his pursuers (the settlement north of Avon is now called Avon-Tyrrell). He then made his way to the coast

and across the Channel to Picardy, France. But, no one pursued.

Prince Henry, who envied his brother William, was not interested in Sir Walter's whereabouts. He was intent upon getting to the capital to be crowned before his older brother Robert (returning from the First Crusade) heard of the death. He knew that in 1091 William and Robert had signed a treaty in which each made the other the heir to his throne should he die childless. Henry arrived in Winchester, seized the King's treasury and crown, and made terms with the Church. He then travelled to London and within four days of William's death had

been proclaimed King of England. Following the shooting, William's body was deserted in the forest. The next day, his body was placed by local farm laborers in the cart of a charcoal-burner named Purkis, taken to Winchester, and buried without ceremony in the cathedral there. (The cathedral tower collapsed in 1107, and legend proclaims it happened because such a sinful king was buried there.)

Sir Walter later returned to England and was forgiven by King Henry (the beneficiary of the "accident"). Legend says that he produced for King Henry the two arrows which had been given to him on the morning of the hunt. He died in the Holy Land in 1136 while taking part in the Second Crusade. His only surviving son, Sir Hugh Tyrrell I, carried on the family name. The 20th century Terrell/Tyrrell (etc.) families of the English-speaking nations are the descendants of Sir Walter.



### Unanswered Questions

Did Sir Walter really kill King William II? Was it an accident? There are conflicting theories. Certainly, nearly 900 years of legends and rumors have clouded the picture.

Sir Walter, by any definition, is an unlikely prime suspect for a conspiracy. From what little is known of his history, he appears to have followed his grandfather and father in the capacity to do the right thing for his family and for his Church. He was a gentle kind of man who was quite liable (according to Cartulary of Hesdun in the *Bibliothèque Nationale*) to exemplify his concern for his feudal tenants by making a free grant of houses to the village of Verton and freedom of toll to Beaurain. But he was a man who, quite by accident, perhaps, was good with a bow. To his dying day he denied any part in the shooting. To the Abbot of St. Denis he is reported to have sworn, in 1135:

"I did not see the King. I was in a different part of the wood on that day. I did not see the King at all during the hunt."

These protestations were uttered at a time when most religious people, as a matter of conviction, held it necessary to make everything right with their consciences before they faced the Almighty. And the record shows Sir Walter to be just such a person. Further, with Henry already dead -- as were most of the others who had been put on the spot by for the death of King William -- there was no point in continuing with a pretence. If Sir Walter said he didn't do it (or didn't know that he did it), his word has very high credibility. Modern-day authors who have expressed an analytical view on the subject have concluded that Sir Walter (a) totally lacked a motive for murder and (b) was a decent, religious man who was not involved in the corrupt court intrigues.

Some (notably Grinnell-Milne) say it was a plot contrived by his wife's family -- the de Clares together with Prince Henry. Her uncles stood to gain very considerably after Henry became King -- one being the Earl of Buckingham and another the Bishop of Winchester! Gilbert de Clare, by his own admission, had plotted to kill King William in 1088. Sir Walter would have been a handy scapegoat.

One author (Tate) suggests Ranulf Flambard, the most powerful man in England, next to the King, as a likely suspect. Although he was probably not in the hunting party, his mysterious activities and accumulation of power and wealth defy explanation.

What about the Church? Several authors suggest the involvement of medieval clergy.

What about the previous deaths in the New Forest of two of King William's relatives? His brother Richard had died while hunting by (a) a pestilential blast (says William of Malmesbury) or (b) from the effects of a blow against a tree (says Gulielmus Gemeticensis). His nephew, also Richard, was (a) wounded by an arrow through the neck or caught by the boughs of a tree and strangled (William of Malmesbury) or (b) killed by the arrow of one of his own knights (Orderic Vitalis and Florence of Worcester).

And, what about the native Saxons? Did they seek vengeance against their Norman conquerors, who had imposed harsher laws than they had ever before known?

We can probably never know. The trail is very, very cold. Many would like to guess. Novelist George Shipway made his contribution to the Tyrrell/Rufus tie-up via two books: *The Paladin*, which is a story about the life of Sir Walter and his father Dean Fulk of Evereux prior to the Rufus killing; and *The Wolf Time*, about Sir Walter and the killing of King William Rufus. Both are written as if Sir Walter had penned the book himself. Shipway was eager to admit -- in a preliminary note to *The Wolf Time* -- that his researches have shed no new light on the killing, that he has taken what he can from the chroniclers and invented the rest. His reconstruction of the killing is valuable because it rings as true as good steel and, for that reason, it could be exact. It takes merit also from the easy-come easy-go atmosphere which prevails throughout.

In Shipway's novels, life is hard and, as a consequence, death is ever at hand. If somebody blocks the path to your goal, there is one short way of removing him. Kill or be killed. Above all, cover your tracks -- or get the monks to do it for you. That was the state of the world on August 2, 1100, when William Rufus closed his eyes upon it. It is probably a mistake to apply our own more "civilized" standards to that distant period when savagery was the rule and exceptions were not plentiful.

### 900 Years Later

Today, the New Forest is still Crown property and a woods. On the site of Tyrrells Ford stands the Tyrrells Ford Hotel. At the scene of the killing stands the iron-encased Rufus Stone, placed there in 1841 to replace an earlier marker that had been defaced. The stone, on three panels, tells the story of the killing of King William II and names Sir Walter Tyrrell (3rd) as the knight who shot the arrow. At the stone is a pleasant picnic area. About 200 yards from the Rufus Stone stands the Sir Walter Tyrrell Inn -- a popular pub and restaurant surrounded by forest, fields, and ponies.

On 20 August 1994 this writer was able to attend the "Rufus Day" meeting sponsored by the Tyrrell Family History Society

(T.F.H.S.) and found a relaxed gathering of members along with a display of T.F.H.S. photos and data and an offering of Tyrrell souvenir items for sale. The BBC thought the gathering sufficiently newsworthy to conduct a live interview on BBC Radio Solent of the T.F.H.S. President John M. Tyrrell and myself at the inn.
